## **Pupil Premium Report**

### **2016 - 2017**

#### **Introduction**

The pupil premium is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers. In the 2016 to 2017 financial year, schools received £1320 for primary aged pupils eligible for pupil premium. Pupil Premium of £1900 is also allocated for children who have been looked after by the local authority (CLA) continuously for more than six months. In East Sussex Pupil Premium for CLA is managed by the Virtual School. Allocations are made to a school based on the numbers eligible at the time of the of the January census. The local authority manages the funding and decides when to pass it on to schools. Head teachers and governors are then accountable for the impact of the pupil premium funding.

Our aim in spending pupil premium is to help these children achieve as well as every other child.

This report details the expenditure of funding, allocated from the Government, to support the narrowing of the attainment gap between disadvantaged pupils and all other pupils. Therefore funding is provided to support those children who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) or who have been eligible in the last 6 years and those children who are in the care of the Local Authority (LAC).

At Glenleigh Park Primary Academy we are working hard to reduce gaps between FSM and non-FSM children and ensure that all children attain age-related expectations, despite their level of disadvantage. The school falls into an area of high deprivation and therefore has been allocated significant sums to ensure this rapid enhanced level of progress and attainment. The Government now wishes for schools to report this expenditure to parents.

\*The Pupil Premium is only paid for those children registered to claim Free School Meals and does not include those who are eligible but are not registered. The child does not have to actually receive the Free School Meal to be eligible, simply being registered is sufficient.

## **In 2015 - 2016 we allocated the Pupil Premium Grant in the following ways:**

### **Nature of support 2016 - 2017**

- Reading Recovery teaching assistant working with Ever 6 children within KS2 to promote a love of reading, comprehension skills and support KS2 test practice
- Interventions run by high level TAs and some 1:1 support
- Provide access to full range of educational experiences: breakfast club, music lessons and instruments • Interventions by Family Support Keyworkers to support vulnerable children's needs.
- Bug Club and Rapid Reader interventions
- Premier Sports to work with Y4 boys to encourage their writing
- Year 6 booster sessions for SATs by specialist Maths Teacher
- Instrumental Tuition
- Extra teachers to support learning of vulnerable groups
- Establishment of nurture groups for KS1 and KS2 to support learning and promote progress
- Provision of breakfast club places to improve attendance
- Speech Link and Language Link intervention and support
- Provision of lunchtime club – led by support staff to support most vulnerable children
- Interventions by Family Support Key Workers to support vulnerable children's needs
- Attendance analysed by Free School Meals / Pupil Premium Grant
- Employing a counsellor one day a week to support children requiring individual nurture support
- Additional high level of support staff to provide high quality guided group work throughout all Maths and Literacy sessions
- Speech and Language specialist employed one day a week to give support where needed
- Introduction of Growth Mindset and implementation of this throughout the school.
- Daily fine and motor skills intervention.
- SLT to support interventions and cover classes, especially in Year 6.

### **Impact** (Non-Validated)

Progress scores are measured between -15 and +15. The top 10% of schools will be above a score of +3. The bottom 10% of schools will be below -3. Scaled scores are awarded on test performance (attainment). The average national scaled score in reading was 104.1 and in maths was 104.1.
